

CYRUS DALLIN ART MUSEUM, INC. – VOLUNTEER MUSEUM GREETER POSITION

The Cyrus Dallin Art Museum is seeking volunteer greeters to welcome guests and assist with simple operating tasks such as collecting admission donations and opening and closing procedures. No prior knowledge about Cyrus Dallin is required. We will train you to be able to capably answer questions about Cyrus Dallin's life and art. Students may earn community service credits through this opportunity.

Responsibilities Include:

- Welcoming and orienting guests
- Assisting with visitor sign-in and admission procedures
- Tracking attendance
- Assisting with gift shop purchases
- Monitoring visitor activity to ensure the safety of the collection
- Performing simple opening and closing procedures
- Responding to visitor questions about the museum's collection and the life of Cyrus Dallin

Time Commitment: At least four hours per month. Greeters typically volunteer from 12:00-2:00 or 2:00-4:00 on Saturdays or Sundays.
